In the rich tapestry of time, 65 years serve as a testament to an unwavering commitment to compassion, justice, and transformative change. The journey that birthed The Society for Animals in Distress (SAID) traces back to the humble origins of the Bantu Animal Welfare Society (BAWS) in October 1958, a visionary endeavour initiated by the late Didi Rutherford.

In those early days, fuelled by an unyielding passion for animal welfare, Didi faced the stark realities of impoverished communities. Armed with nothing more than a borrowed butchery van and an indomitable determination to alleviate suffering, Didi and her team ventured into the heart of despair. Animals, languishing without proper care, bore witness to the conditions that ignited a spark of hope in Didi's heart—a spark that would not be extinguished.

From those modest beginnings, where a shoebox served as a filing system, SAID has grown into a beacon of hope, annually providing professional veterinary care to thousands of animals in a state-of-theart hospital. Expanding beyond the hospital, SAID boasts an equine clinic, a barn shop, and an administration block, all situated on a 4.7-hectare plot in Midrand.



Today, a fleet of bakkies navigates impoverished communities daily, addressing the stark dichotomy in living conditions within mere miles of each other. On one side, opulence and abundance; on the other, poverty, starvation, and lack of shelter. SAID bridges this heartbreaking gap, offering not just veterinary care but also education and sustainable development for responsible animal ownership.

In the face of enduring political and economic challenges, SAID stands tall as a beacon of hope, embodying the spirit of ubuntu— the understanding that helping others is what matters most.

As we celebrate this remarkable milestone, we acknowledge that compiling a comprehensive history of SAID and recognizing every contributor is an impossible task.














Welfare Veterinary Clinic

SAID operates a cutting-edge veterinary clinic offering a range of services at significantly subsidized welfare rates. Equipped with advanced radiographic and diagnostic tools, our clinic has become an epicenter for diverse treatments including surgery and consultations. On an average day, we care for 30-40 hospital patients, addressing a wide array of conditions from severe injuries and diseases to performing standard procedures such as sterilization or dentistry.

Spay & Neuter Initiatives

Understanding the critical role of sterilization in reducing animal suffering and homelessness, SAID has dedicated efforts towards providing subsidized sterilizations for pets in underprivileged communities across Midrand and surrounding areas. In this fiscal year, we have successfully sterilized **3 416** cats and dogs, contributing to our cumulative milestone of around **188 357** animals sterilized to date.

Mobile Clinic & Ambulance Services

Our Mobile Clinic, a cornerstone of our outreach, extends primary healthcare directly to animals in the underserved communities of Tembisa, Ivory Park, Winnie Mandela and Olievenhoutbosch. This initiative includes the rescue of injured and sick animals, provision of primary healthcare, and transportation of those in need to SAID's hospital for specialized treatment.

Parasite Control Program


Recognizing the detrimental effects of parasites on pet health, our comprehensive parasite control program is vital in improving the well-being of pets and their human families. SAID ensures all hospital patients receive parasite treatment, and extends these services through our mobile clinics in the communities we support, focusing on controlling ticks, fleas, worms, and mange.

Vaccination Campaigns

Vaccinations are integral to SAID's strategy to prevent the spread of infectious and fatal diseases in pets as well as zoonotic diseases which could be fatal to humans. Our vaccination program targets diseases such as parvovirus, distemper, parainfluenza, adenovirus, and rabies in dogs, as well as calicivirus, panleukopaenia, chlamydia, rhinotracheitis, feline herpesvirus (FHV), and rabies in cats.

In recognizing the financial constraints faced by many non-profit organizations, we take pride in providing a cost-effective solution.




